Pinolith

Pinolith (or “Pinolite” if you’re an American) is a rare metamorphic rock which until recently was known only from one location – the magnesite deposit at Sunk, Styria, Austria, where it was first discovered in 1873.

Pinolith is composed of magnesite crystals in a dolomite and graphite matrix.

Although the hardness is only 3.5 to 5, with care it can be cut and polished into quite spectacular ornamental stones.

Where did the name come from? The magnesite crystals in Pinolith are shaped like pine nuts from the European stone pine tree (*Pinus pinea*). Pine nuts are small edible seeds from pine trees common to Europe and Asia. They are added to bread, salad, and meat or vegetable dishes. The suffix *-lith* is from the Greek word *lithos*, or "stone".

Radiometric dating estimates that this mineral was formed around 500 million years ago.

Now for the exciting part. Although Austria was the only known source of Pinolith for 145 years, a new deposit was discovered just 3 years ago (2018) in British Columbia, Canada.

The Canadian variety of Pinolith also contains minor traces of additional minerals such as Quartz, Zircon, Apatite and Titanite (Sphene).

It is believed that the Canadian Pinolith differs from the Austrian Pinolite in a number of ways. Such examples are that the formation is believed to be older – around 544 million years, the patterns are different (six identified differences) and the presence of Pyrite provides a unique gold color, which is in stones that are oxidized. There is a pending verification from the American Gem Trade Association to state that the Canadian “Pinolite” will be classified as a semi-precious gemstone.

And sometimes I think I am in Vincible, but life shows me I am not.

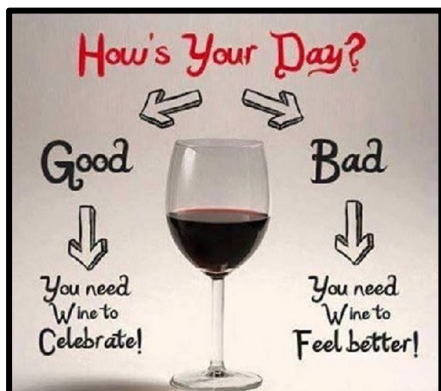
People keep telling me I'm in Denial but I'm positive I've never been there before!

When bowing to nobility, a gentleman would literally put his best foot forward, extending his leg to take the bow.



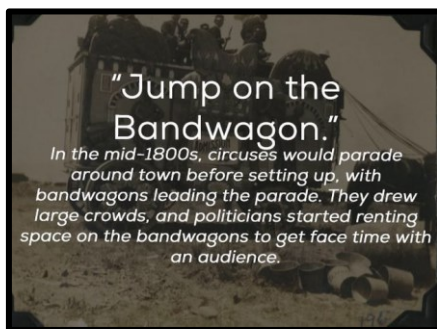
"In the Nick of Time."

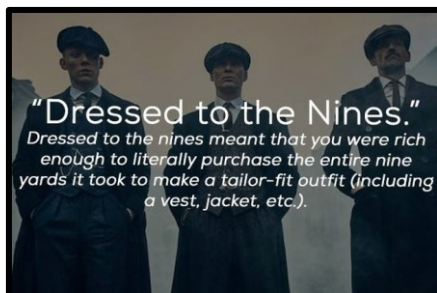
"Get off your High Horse."

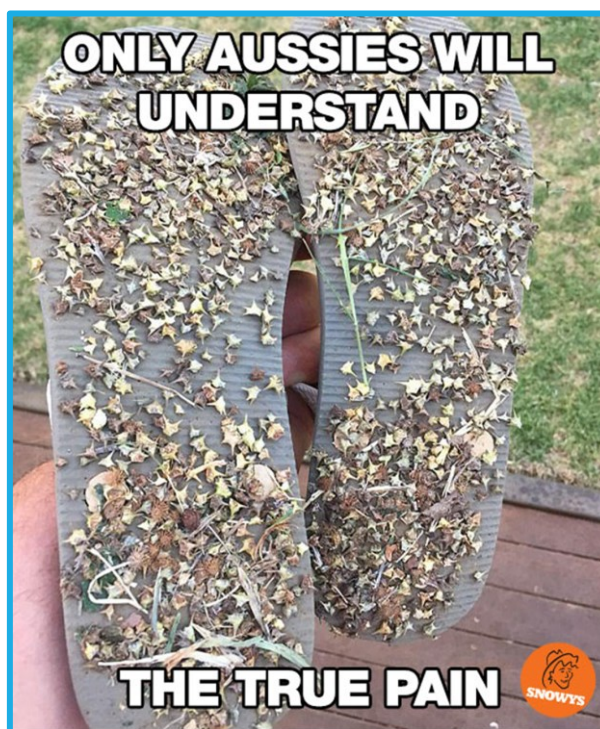


Retirement Message
