Sugilite

Sugilite is a classic example of a mineral name pronounced wrongly more often than correctly. Named after Japanese petrologist Dr. Ken-ichi Sugi, whose name is pronounced with a hard "g" (as in "geese"), whereas most English speakers mispronounce it with a soft "g" (as in "gene"). This was not much of an issue when Sugilite was discovered as an obscure ugly greenish-yellowish-brown rock-forming mineral on Iwagi Island, Shikoku, Japan in 1944, but when it was found in South Africa as large quantities of bright purple lapidary rock and thousands of people in the gem trade started talking about it, the bad pronunciation became entrenched. Although discovered in 1944, it was only named and published later in April 1976.

A bright, saturated violet-to-magenta material was found in large quantities in 1979 at the Wessels mine in Kuruman district, part of the Northern Cape province of South Africa. The Wessels mine is a manganese mine that began operating in May 1973. Gem quality Sugilite was found by accident when the roof of a shaft caved in during the development of the mine.

When the find was published in 1980, the South African Sugilite was described as having a vitreous lustre and granular texture, with a chemical composition identical to the occurrence in Japan. The only difference - the bold purple colour - was caused by manganese impurities in its chemical structure.

Due to the location of this find, you may hear translucent, faceted Sugilite from South Africa referred to as 'Wesselite'. It also goes by the name of 'Royal Lavulite' or 'Royal Azel' if more lavender in colour.

The rare, dark purple translucent material is known as 'gel Sugilite' and highly valuable. The known reserves at the Wessels mine are exhausted and Sugilite has become a pricey and sought-after gem. Sugilite has also been found in Canada, Italy, Australia, and India, although these occurrences are not the gem quality purple material produced by the Wessels mine. Crystal specimens are very rare.

Sugilite has a complex chemical formula, KNa2Li3Fe2(Si12O30) meaning that its chemical composition is potassium, sodium, lithium ferric iron silicate. It is part of the cyclosilicate group. Cyclosilicate is a compound of silicate tetrahedra, consisting of a central silicon atom surrounded by four oxygen atoms.

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



European heritage

- Known as The Bluff since European settlement, this headland was officially named Rosetta Head to honour the wife of George Fife Angas, who was an important figure in the establishment of South Australia.
- The Rosetta Harbor anchorage was abandoned after 1837 when the John Pirie was blown ashore in heavy weather and the Solway and South Australia were wrecked nearby. Safer anchorage was developed at Granite Island.
- The Bluff was owned in 1840 by Captain John Hindmarsh, at a time when it was considered that Victor Harbor might become the State capital.
- Apart from small mining ventures and stock grazing, The Bluff was largely left in its natural state until 1938, when it was declared a recreation reserve. σ

The Whaling industry

The Bluff was used for many purposes over the years, and in the 1800's the whaling industry was established - there was a small whaling community based at Encounter Bay. The summit became a lookout station where a flag was raised to signal whale sightings to the base further down The Bluff.

- The peak of the Bluff is about 150 metres above sea level and affords a view of the sea horizon for more than 50km. This made it easy for the naked eye to spot whales within 10 km so the long boats could be launched to row out and harpoon the whales.
- Fortunately whaling ceased here in the mid-1860s and whale numbers have been increasing ever since between the months of May and November you may be fortunate enough to see a Southern Right Whale. The whales favour the sheltered water between the nearby Islands and the coast.


