Augie's October 2017 Agate Selection - Coyamito, Mexico.


Coyamito Agate is a nodular banded agate found about thirty miles north of the Laguna agate deposits in Chihuahua, Mexico. It is found in multiple deposits, most of which are located on the Coyamito Ranch.

Coyamito agate nodules have the reputation of being small and colourful. Of all the banded agates found in Chihuahua, Coyamito is considered the closest relative to the Laguna agate. Like Laguna agate, Coyamito is characterized by colourful tight banding. Most Coyamito nodules are hollow and the colour strength is in the outside banding. Other features include pseudomorphic agate, which is agate replacement of Aragonite, and tube formations. Agate pseudomorphs are usually rare, but are common in Coyamito agate. Continued next page..





Once filled with bombs, then overrun by wallabies and kangaroos, the Queensland town of Charters Towers transforms WWII bunkers into interactive tourist attraction. (ABC North Qld By Sophie Kesteven.)

A total of 29 concrete WWII bunkers are scattered around Tower Hill in the outback town of Charters Towers in North Queensland. None of the bunkers face each other – for good reason, according to Charters Towers local, Alan Hartley. "Because had there been an accident and one exploded, it would not set off a chain reaction with the others", Mr Hartley explained. "They were used to store bombs, ammunition, explosives, detonators...and they were all covered in mullock from the mullock heap so planes flying over would not know there were 29 little cement sheds down there full of explosives."

Now, hoping to attract tourists and educate people about the town's history with the war, the local council has helped install an interactive audio and video feature inside two of the bunkers on Towers Hill.

Discovery and History

In 1965, Harry Schiller, a local farmer prospecting in the Cowell area of the Eyre Peninsular (South Australia), collected a 3-4-kilogram boulder of dense hard rock near an outcrop of white, dolomitic marble. In early 1966, this specimen was identified as nephrite at Adelaide University. This identification was confirmed subsequently at the South Australian Museum and Australian Mineral Development Laboratories in Adelaide.

During the following years many attempts were made to develop the deposits, but with limited success. The period from 1966 to 1973 saw many disputes and changes in tenure. Involvement of the South Australian State Government commenced in February 1974 when the potential of the area for commercial production was fully evaluated. The 1974 geological appraisal was followed, in 1976, by Government funding of a trial mining program and an evaluation of the colours, texture, and carving potential of the nephrite at O'Halloran Hill College of Advanced Education.

Ninety-one separate jade outcrops were identified in 1974, but subsequent mapping has now increased this to well over a hundred. All outcrops of nephrite are located within an area of about 10 km2, referred to as the Cowell Jade Province.


After its formation in 1976, Cowell Jade Pty Ltd became the dominant lease holder and

marketeer of Cowell jade. In January 1987, Cowell Jade Pty Ltd became a public company and changed its name to Gemstone Corporation of Australia Ltd. After more than a decade of mixed fortune, the Gemstone Corporation entered an agreement with the Malaysian-based Royal Selangor Group to design, produce and market carvings, and items of jewellery, and tiles from Cowell (nephrite) jade.

Geology

The (nephrite) jade bodies at Cowell typically have elongate, lensoid shapes in outcrop. Host rocks for Cowell nephrite are dolomitic marble and banded calc-silicate of the Early to Middle Proterozoic Minbrie Gneiss Complex. These high-grade metamorphic rocks were produced during the first and second deformational events of the Kimban Orogeny, about 1840 and 1780 million years (Ma) ago respectively. Subsequent retrogression occurred about 1700 Ma with later cross-warping and alteration about 1590-1600 Ma. Nephrite only formed within the alteration/retrogression assemblages.

Alteration zones, consisting of tremolite, chlorite, epidote, clinozoisite/zoisite and talc, occur particularly along the margins of, or near intrusive chloritised feldspar rock that has intruded dolomitic marble.

Cowell nephrite formed:

- 1. Within alteration zones as large lenses up to 40 m long by 3 m wide, conformable with lithological layering.
- 2. Within cross fractures up to a metre wide parallel to the axial plane of late-stage crosswarping. Nephrite in cross fractures is typically high quality, fine grained,

massive, and dark green to black - but sometimes it does occur in rarer translucent light green colours.

3. By irregular alteration of coarse grained, brecciated diopside producing schistose nephrite that often has diopside inclusions.

The Cowell geological setting of Middle Proterozoic dolomitic marble host rocks contrasts with other major occurrences of nephrite in New Zealand, Canada, and Taiwan; where nephrite lenses occur within or along the faulted margins of serpentinised ultramafic rocks such as peridotites.

Quality and Value

Cowell jade exhibits a variety of colours and textures, but consists predominantly of medium to fine grained material showing, greenish yellow to green hues, grading to black. Three main varieties are marketed:


- Green Nephrite.
- Black Nephrite.
- Premium Black Nephrite.

Dark green to black varieties predominate, however the typical apple and emerald green colours of some overseas deposits are lacking.

Cowell black jade takes a very high polish by simple lapidary techniques. Very fine grained premium black takes a mirror-like polish, superior to that produced on jade elsewhere. Spectacular rarer varieties, particularly those derived from rind patterns and dendritic inclusions, greatly enhance the appearance of Cowell jade.

Mining and Presentation

Mining of Cowell jade is undertaken periodically - depending on stock on hand and current demand. The country rock on the hanging wall contact of the nephrite lens is drilled, blasted, and removed to expose a wall of jade. Then shot holes are drilled and overburden is removed. The nephrite is broken and levered onto the pit floor by an excavator-mounted hydraulic rock breaker. Rough nephrite is then trucked 25 km to Cowell for sawing and grading according to its colour and quality. Some nephrite is exported in the rough; other jade is processed further by cut and polished for jewellery, or presented as polished ornamental slabs.

Jade of carving quality is first trimmed with a diamond saw, carved using diamond tipped tools, and then polished with a diamond paste to achieve its characteristic final lustre.



Ik Kil is a cenote outside Pisté in the Tinúm Municipality, Yucatán, Mexico. It is in the northern centre of the Yucatán Peninsula and is part of the Ik Kil Archeological Park near Chichen Itza.

The cenote is open to the sky with the water level about 26 metres below ground level. There is a carved stairway down to a swimming platform. The cenote is about 60 metres in diameter and about 40 metres deep.

There are vines which reach from the opening all the way down to the water along with small waterfalls. There are black catfish which swim in the cenote. Cenote Ik Kil is sacred to the Mayans and the Mayans used this cenote for both relaxation and ritual services.

Carlsbad Caverns National Park is a United States National Park in the Guadalupe Mountains of south eastern New Mexico. The primary attraction of the park is the show cave, Carlsbad Cavern. Carlsbad Caverns National Park is open every day of the year except Thanksgiving, Christmas, and New Year's Day. Visitors to the cave can hike in on their own via the natural entrance or take an elevator from the visitor centre.

The park entrance is located on US Highway 62/180, approximately 29 km southwest of Carlsbad, New Mexico. Carlsbad Caverns National Park participates in the Junior Ranger Program. The park has two entries on the National Register of Historic Places: The Caverns Historic District and the Rattlesnake Springs Historic District. Approximately two thirds of the park have been set aside as a wilderness area, helping to ensure no future changes will be made to the habitat.

Carlsbad Cavern includes a large cave chamber (The Big Room), a natural limestone chamber almost 1,220 m long, 191 m wide, and 255 78 m high at the highest point. It is the fifth largest chamber in North America and the twenty-eighth largest in the world.

Tales from a former SAR Train Driver. 'Beating the Winter Cold'.

Working with the engine in reverse between Yeelanna and Tooligie was no joke, especially in the early hours of the morning in the middle of winter. They had only travelled one section with the icy wind pouring in over the coal tender into the engine cab, before both Lennie and Mud were almost frozen stiff. The engine working backwards with the funnel facing the leading trucks offered absolutely no protection from the bitterly cold wind that their passage was raising. So, at the next station Lennie stopped the train to seek some protection from the inclement weather.

Mudrock, never at a loss returned after a few moments with a truck tarpaulin, which he dropped over the tender then up over the cab roof, lashing it down with the tie ropes, completely isolating the cab from the elements, leaving only the bottom corner of the tarpaulin loose, allowing both men access to the cab. Squeezing through the narrow flap into the cab, both boys were happy as the warmth of their improvised shelter spread through their ice-cold bodies.

They were as snug as two bugs in a rug, as Mud so aptly described it. Only one thing was wrong. Len couldn't see where they were going. Mudrock looked at him and laughed saying, 'You could only see two bloody yards before, so what's the difference,' which was true enough as there was only a tiny marker light on the tender anyway. 'Open your window and stick your head out', was Mudrock's unsympathetic reply. 'Anyway, if you put the headlight on full beam and look through the cab windows you'll be able to see where you've been.'

They arrived snug and warm at Tooligie a few hours later for their relief. Mudrock, Len and Snow made their way towards the barracks, which were only discernible as a darker patch in the scrub which surrounded them. The running lights of the locomotive distorted by a haze of steam behind them accentuated the darkness. The grass crackled under foot, and reflected silver shimmers from Snow's kero lamp as they walked. Again, they felt the bitter cold and as they approached, the three men quickened their pace over the frost covered ground. Walking through the open gateway onto the barracks verandah, Mudrock and Lennie stood back to allow Snow to precede them with the lamp. Leading the way to the kitchen door, Snow slipped the strap of his tucker box off his shoulder, lowered the box to the floor and, cradling his handlamp in the crook of his arm, inserted a large key into the doorlock.

With a loud scrape, the door was thrust open. The three men entered the room depositing their tucker boxes on the floor. Snow then lit the two kero lamps and the room's interior became visible.

It was a very austere room, some fifteen feet in length and almost as wide. A large black cast iron wood stove dominated one wall, a large zinc lined box filled with cut wood and stumps located beside it. In front of the wood box on the floor was an old paint tin partly filled with kero swabs. Lennie, taking one of these swabs and placing it under the kindling of the pre-set stove, struck a match, and the small flame ran up the swab into the kindling wood and soon a fire danced merrily in the stove, dispelling the damp cold from the room, its warmth embracing the train crew as they pulled wooden chairs forward to sit as close as possible to the warm glow.

The room was lined with quarter inch galvanized iron, which had at one time been painted a light grey, but years of dust, grime and smoke from the lamps and stove did nothing to improve its appearance. The floor was simply railway sleepers laid edge to edge, very rough, but cleanly swept. On nails tacked into the wall, adjacent to the stove, hung a bevy of frypans several saucepans and a wire grill.

Along the other wall was a bench with sink and drainboard, a recent addition to the amenities of this room. 

(Women will LOVE this one!)


